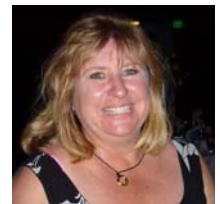

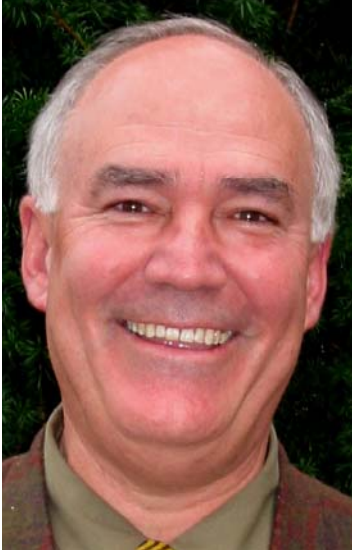

General Information and Upcoming Events:

STAR Test: The mandated State Testing and Reporting Program (STAR) for grades 2-5 will take place from May 7 through May 17. The STAR Test assesses students by grade level in the areas of reading, language, mathematics, spelling, and science at fifth grade. The information we receive for each individual student allows us to plan thoughtful, relevant instruction to meet the child’s needs. Information regarding our school results assists us in reviewing the success of our curricular program. These assessments are an opportunity for students to show at least one aspect of what they have learned to date, as measured against grade level curriculum standards. For now, please help your student and us by NOT scheduling family excursions or medical/dental appointments, especially on the mornings of the dates indicated above. If you have questions, please contact us directly.

The end to the school year is fast approaching and we only have 8 weeks of school left. Typically, students have long-term culminating projects and activities that require them to plan, organize and manage their time and activities well so that their work is done thoughtfully and the finished product represents their best effort. You can help your child by staying abreast of what needs to be done so you can guide and counsel appropriately. You may need to contact the classroom teacher for specifics so you and your child can be on the same page. Let us know how we can help.

What Would You Do With \$2.7 Million?

When school districts across California opened their doors last Fall, Palo Alto Unified found a nice surprise from Sacramento – an unprecedented \$2.7 million payable to our students. Here's the latest on how this money will be spent.

Spending Not Yet Approved

Arts, Music & PE -- one-time grant of \$855,000

3% for administrative indirect costs

8% for professional development

The remaining 89%:

- 1/3 will be used for PE (including dance for secondary schools)

- 2/3 will be used for visual arts, music and drama (including dance for elementary schools)

Arts & Music – recurring grant of \$177,401

3% for administrative indirect costs

8% for professional development

89% will be spent on K-12 visual arts, music and drama.

Funds will be allocated on a per student basis district-wide. At the elementary schools, funds will remain at the district. At the middle and high schools, funds will be disbursed to the sites. The District expects to report spending decisions to the School Board in May.

District Discretionary – one-time grant of \$64,000

Anticipates that these funds will be pay for a Charter School Task Force if needed and to extend the work of the Attendance Area Advisory Group Task Force.

Spending Approved by School Board

One-Time Grants

Site Discretionary -- \$677,000 ~ \$58.74/student

To be spent as proposed by each school's Site Council.

Instructional Materials, Library & Technology -- \$171,000

- Half will be used to purchase library books

- The other half will go to selected elementary sites which in Fall 2007 will set up prototype tech classrooms.

District Discretionary -- \$160,000

Will fund the High School Task Force and Foreign Language in the Elementary Schools (FLES) Implementation Plan.

Recurring Grants

Counselors -- \$340,000 ~ \$66.22/student

Used to hire more school counselors in Grades 7-12.

Economic Impact Aid -- \$246,710 expected

Will fund the English Language Master Plan for English language learners and help close the achievement gap.

District Application Not Yet Approved by the State

English Language Learners – one-time grant of \$25,384 expected

Will upgrade instructional materials and pilot Dyn-Ed (a computer-based English language program) at Briones.

Career Technology – one-time grant of \$15/Regional Occupational Program student expected

Will buy equipment and supplies if Santa Clara County Office of Education distributes these funds to school districts.

Help Students in Need: Ecumenical Hunger Program's Back to School Supply Drive

Most of us don't think twice, when we pay for lengthy lists of binders, folders, scissors and glue sticks. But back-to-school necessities are simply not a priority when a family struggles to afford housing or food.

Friederike Buelow is working on a School Outreach program to provide back to school supplies for students in need. She is working in partnership with two nonprofits: East Palo Alto's Ecumenical Hunger Program (EHP) and Kits for Kidz™.

EHP is a 32 year old, private, non-profit, community-based organization that provides emergency food, case management and household essentials to families in need.

Kits for Kidz™ is a program dedicated to supplying new school supplies to children who otherwise might go without.

The mission of the partnership program is to provide school supplies to less fortunate children in East Palo Alto and surrounding communities. Last year about 200 out of 1000+ students received this assistance.

Several PAUSD classrooms have joined with EHP to help. Margo Wixsom, photography teacher at PALY, integrates fundraising into her curriculum as "service based learning." Some students are filling backpacks with pencils, highlighters, boxes of crayons, binders and notebooks for this program. "Backpack Rally" is the name they gave the project. Others have chosen to raise money to

buy backpacks filled with Back-to-School supplies for a bargain price of \$17 at www.kitsforkidz.org. The class will document the process in a photography project; everybody who participates- in real time or virtually- earns extra credit towards the final grade. Jordan Middle School's Teal Team is assembling kits in April under the orchestration of teacher Tami Warr. Meanwhile, Gunn's German Club, under the leadership of teacher Kertin Helbling, has chosen to do a fundraiser to buy backpacks online.

Palo Alto's PTA Council has endorsed the partnership program and EHP hopes to grow the effort in 2007, so that every child in our community will be prepared to begin a new school year.

If you would like to help, EHP encourages student groups and their families to:

- Collect supplies, assemble them into kits, and deliver them to EHP.
- Raise money to order fully assembled backpack kits to be distributed through EHP from www.kitsforkidz.org.

The website has a drop-down menu listing EHP as its partner. Any number of kits can be ordered.
